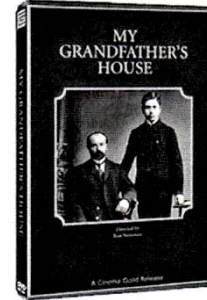
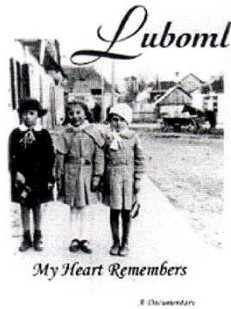

WITASWAN ("wit-uh-swan") is an Illinois-based initiative originally developed by AAUW-Illinois. Local collaborators have included AWJ (Association for Women Journalists), CAWHC (Chicago Area Women's History Council), IWA (International Women Associates), IWPA (Illinois Woman's Press Association), WIF/C (Women in Film/Chicago), and WIDC (Women in the Director's Chair), as well as Cinema/Chicago and IFP-Chicago (Independent Feature Project).

In 2007, WITASWAN founder Jan Lisa Huttner and Martha Richards (Executive Director of WomenArts) joined forces, and together they turned WITASWAN into a world-wide movement now known as "International SWAN Day."

LUBOML: MY HEART REMEMBERS

In 1940 the Jewish *shtetl* of Luboml in Poland was a vibrant town where religious tradition and community life coexisted. No quaint rural village, Luboml was an important regional market town, complete with a theater, cinema, electric lights, sports teams, and many trades and businesses, factories and workshops, as shown in the film through archival photos and footage.

Nazi genocidal actions in Poland in 41/42 destroyed the Jewish community in Luboml, including the execution of nearly all its Jewish citizens, as recounted through moving interviews with Holocaust survivors and other former residents of Luboml. (Film runtime: 57 minutes)

MY GRANDFATHER'S HOUSE

My Grandfather's House, a personal documentary, follows filmmaker Eileen Douglas's determined search to find her grandfather's house in Lithuania, the home he lived in and left behind in 1911 when he fled, at 16, from Kovno to America to escape the Tsar's Army. Four decades after his death, with only fragments to guide the way, the documentary is Douglas' attempt to lift the veil of darkness and discover "where it all began." Traveling from New York City, to the U.S. Holocaust Memorial Museum in Washington, to her mother's attic in Syracuse, to the homes of relatives and, finally, to the block in Kovno where her grandfather once lived, along the way she unexpectedly unlocks the mystery of stories he never told, discovers the fate of family members lost in the war, learns of the glory that once was Lithuanian Jewry, finds living relatives missing for years in Siberia, and resurrects a family shattered by the traumas of the 20th Century.

The documentary weaves together original footage, old family photographs, archival records, translations of old Yiddish letters, archival film footage, family reminiscences, interviews, conversations, and music scored to evoke a vanished era. (Film runtime: 72 minutes)
